


Kite Day by Will Hillenbrand


I Want My Hat Back by Jon Klassen




Books for “Cat Party”

Stack the Cats by Susie Ghahremani


One cat sleeps. Two cats play. Three cats stack!

What Will Fat Cat Sit On? by Jan Thomas


What *will* Fat Cat sit on? The pig? (*Oink!*) The chicken? (*Cluck!*) How about the dog? (*Grrrr.*)




Books for “There’s a Spider on the Floor”

The Tickly Spider by Margaret Wise Brown


"Deep, deep, deep in the grassy wilds the little boy looked. And as he watched, he saw strange things..."


The Eensy Weensy Spider Freaks Out (Big Time!) by Troy Cummings

Books for “The Penguin Dance”


Lost and Found by Oliver Jeffers


Emperor Penguins by Deborah Lock


Busy Penguins by John Schindel

Penguin and Pinecone by Salina Yoon


When curious Penguin finds a lost pinecone in the snow, their friendship grows into something extraordinary!



Books for “Baby Shark”


Misunderstood Shark: Friends Don't Eat Friends by Ame Dyckman


Shark Reef by Niki Foreman
